

Recovery and protection of the Moore River Catchment's threatened natural assets

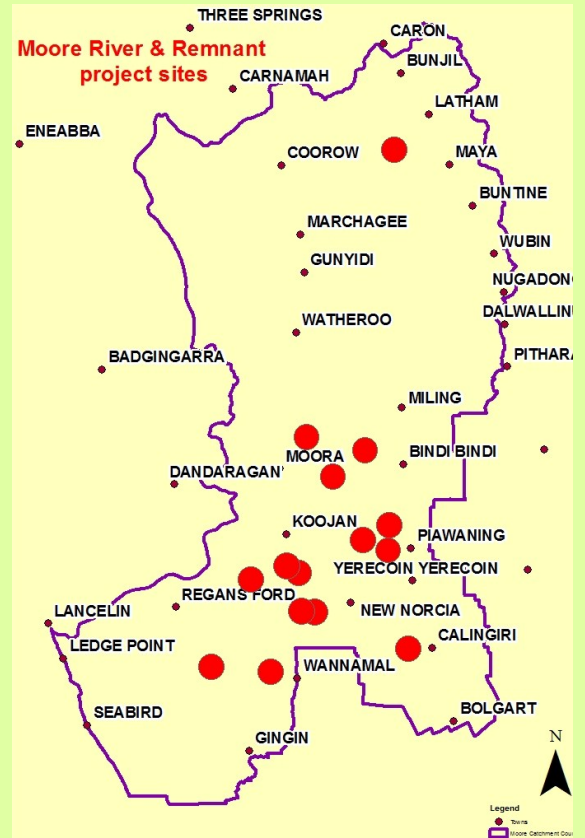


What are natural assets?

Natural assets are assets of the natural environment. These consist of the biological assets, land and water areas with their ecosystems, subsoil assets and air.

The iconic Moore River is a natural, cultural and economic asset which needs protecting and managing in ways that will protect it from continued stock damage and also reduce salinity and erosion effects, so that it can be enjoyed by everyone for many years to come.

Some of the vegetation associations in the Moore catchment are down to their last remnant, and once they are gone, there will be no return. Agricultural clearing has had a heavy impact on the native vegetation in the catchment so it is imperative to protect the remaining remnants for biodiversity and future posterity.



This project has enabled:

22.75km of priority native vegetation to be fenced off and protected

20km of the Moore River to be fenced and protected

18ha of riparian zone to be re-vegetated

A total of 476 hectares has been fenced off and conserved for the future.
