Key Achievements

The Moore Catchment Council (MCC) is a not-for-profit organisation focussing on the protection and enhancement of the Moore River and its catchment.

MCC is now into it's 26 year of history of attracting natural resource management grants and successfully completing projects that improve the Moore River catchment.

This financial year MCC has attracted \$455,831 in new grants spread over 10 projects. 5 projects have been successfully completed and acquitted.

Finalist in the 2021 WA Landcare Awards

The MCC and the Yued Community of Moora are nominated in the Western Australian Landcare Awards - Australian Government Partnerships for Landcare Award Category. A Presentation Dinner held will be held at the Kalamunda Community centre on Friday 19th November 2021.

Outstanding Effort:

- 89,300 native seedlings planted to improve biodiversity in the catchment;
- Directly engaging 664 members of the community to to actively take part in landcare & coastcare projects;
- 14,940 hours of volunteer labour contributions equating to approximately of \$747,000 in-kind support (including 125hr from children <18);
- Management (Juggling) of 10 projects during the year with only1 full time Landcare officer.

Showcase

- Showcasing the Moora Carnaby's Black Cockatoo conservation program to WA Governor Kim Beazley and demonstrating log nest monitoring of chicks with the pole camera;
- Partnering with the Kerkhoff Carnaby Group and Shire of Moora to build a 10.7m high sculpture of two Carnabys in Moora for education and tourism purposes. MCC are administration the project. Completion estimate Dec 2022;
- Demonstrating to the world how important Moora is for Carnabys through viral video shared by renown Australian Conservationist Tim Faulkner (70,000+ views);
- Finalist for WA Landcare Awards in the Australian Government Partnership for Landcare Award Category.



2020-2021 Financial Report

Moore Catchment Council has had a successful year with receiving grants from Iluka, State NRM grants, CEP grant, Membership from Shire Councils within the Catchment, Donations from community, and fee for service. These grants were enhanced by the State NRMO Capability grants which helped with the employment of Staff, allowing MCC to employ a Community Landcare Co-ordinator and a part time Executive Officer. MCC partnered with the Kerkhoff Carnaby's Group to raise money for the Moora Big Carnaby Cockatoo sculpture. Impact of COVID –19





PROGRAMS

Carnaby's Black Cockatoo Conservation

Carnaby's Black Cockatoo conservation projects funded through Iluka – involving planting native species, erecting & monitoring artificial log nests, new signage for reserves, school planting and information events, Yued engagement through revegetation and fencing activities, information booklets and videos;

Conserving, Restoring and Promoting Moore Natural Assets

Conserving Moore natural assets funded through State NRM Program – involving revegetating degraded farm land, fencing creeks and bushland, information events, and Yued engagement through seed collection and revegetation; Partnership with West Koojan-Gillingarra LCDC researching historic local landcare projects and identifying future projects.

Aboriginal Engagement and Partnership

Funded through Iluka and State NRM Program, this project provides opportunities to work on country to collect and process native seed, native reserve fencing, revegetation and knowledge sharing. Working in partnership to improve health of Moore catchment and improve local Aboriginal wellbeing.

Coastal Rehabilitation

Two projects funded through State NRM Program & National Landcare Program will allow herbicide spraying of 11ha Pyp Grass (Ehrharta villosa) to help native vegetation return. Community volunteers will revegetate 1ha using native seedlings grown from native seed collected by community volunteers on the Guilderton dunes.

Healthy Soils, Healthy Environment

Good soil health has direct links to a healthy environment and positive community health. Funded through the State NRM Program, this project will provide opportunities for community and school children to explore soil health These will include healthy soils & permaculture workshops, and promotion of insect ID resources.



CARNABY'S BLACK COCKATOO CONSERVATION

Iluka - "Supporting the Community to Conserve Carnaby's Black Cockatoo" Project funding 179,300 Project Total \$340,003

6 land managers planted **25,000** native trees and shrubs which are priority species for Carnaby's forage and breeding habitat. Species included Eucalyptus, Hakeas, Grevilleas, and Banksias.

ABORIGINAL ENGAGEMENT AND PARTNERSHIP

Partnering with local Yued community to carry out conservation works at the **Old Reserve** south of Moora. Works included a **perimeter fence, walk trail, bollarding** and **4 amazing interpretative signs**. An opening event in September 2020 saw 80-90 of the local Aboriginal community come together in commemoration of leaving the reserve 42 years previous, and celebrating the new works carried out.





COASTAL REHABILITATION

CSGS19032 - "Restoration of Guilderton dunes through weed control and community planting" Grant Total \$34,984 Total Project \$88,618

CEP78554 - "Guilderton Dune Restoration" Grant Total \$20,000 Total Project \$43,266

Pyp Grass (Ehrharta villosa) control on Guilderton's dunes. Pyp Grass is a invasive weed which outcompetes native vegetation. 11ha of Pyp grass was sprayed with herbicide in Spring 2020 and Autumn 2021. In partnership with Shire of Gingin and Guilderton Community Association.



2 community native seed collection and processing workshop was held with APACE nursery to train and empower volunteers in collecting native seed from the dunes that will be used in future revegetation projects. Volunteers received a DBCA seed collecting licence.



4 Community planting days for rehabilitating the Guilderton dunes were organised involving 85 volunteer planters. A 1.5ha degraded area was revegetated using 1500 native plants including Acacia cyclops, Calothamnus quadrifidus, Hardenbergia comptoniana, Melaleuca huegelii, Melaleuca systena, Carpobrotus virescens and Spyridium globulosum.
