





CHAIR'S MESSAGE 2023

One thing being a farmer , is my income is derived from managing my environment. Last season we had a record harvest on the farm at Miling and this season we have had 165mm of rain for the year. We could not get two contrasting seasons in a row if we tried to.

So, this low rainfall has resulted in low yields, but looking back at our 115 year history of farming in this area, the telling story is that with taking good care of our fragile soils through liming and using no tillage farming, I have produced a crop. Back in 1969 my dads crop died on slightly more rainfall.

By having a modern farming system, combined with caring for our environment, with years of tree planting and fencing off and managing saline areas, we have survived one of the harshest droughts in our area for decades. My farming system has diverse rotations, stores lots of fodder, runs sheep and employs 3 full time employees.

Now you know that we have had a very dry season in the upper Moore catchment area , it will help you all understand why our river flow has been quite low this year. Our creek system in the upper Moore river has not run all year. This is very unusual. Is it climate change or climate variability ? I am not sure, but I know it hurts when we don't get good rains.

With a very dry season in the MCC region , it has had challenges with vermin (large increase in cats, foxes and wild pigs), weeds are always coming at us , especially uncontrolled spiney rush in our water ways, and salinity is raising its ugly head too. I mention these as it is important that as a region we keep working at managing these ferals and getting funding to do so.

There has been a lot of positive work done by Rachel , Helen and Sarah (and friends) to keep NRM work happening and being promoted. This telling of our stories of what we do is so important , and I love how the NRM folk love doing so , just like Fred said at one of our last stand events- story telling is everything – its how we all learn and all remember.

Thankyou to everyone on the committee , volunteers, the noongar crew and our valued employees for another great NRM year. Keep up the great work , have a great Christmas and let the rains fall and our river flood in 2024.

Key Achievements

The Moore Catchment Council (MCC) is a not-for-profit organisation focussing on the protection and enhancement of the Moore River and its catchment.

MCC is now into it's 28 year of history of attracting natural resource management grants and successfully completing projects that improve the Moore River catchment.

This financial year MCC has attracted \$305,399 in new grants spread over 10 projects. 4 New & 6 existing, 2 projects have been successfully completed and acquitted.

Outstanding Effort:

- 96,230 native seedlings planted to improve biodiversity in the catchment;
- Directly engaging 3,525 members of the community to actively take part in landcare & coastcare projects, and raising their awareness of the Moore's natural assets;
- 184,098 hours of volunteer labour contributions equating to approximately \$185,170 of in-kind support (including 848hrs from children <18);
- Management (Juggling) of 10 projects during the year with only 1 (nearly) full time Landcare officer.

2022-2023 Financial Report

Moore Catchment Council has had a successful year with receiving grants from Iluka, State NRM grants, Membership from Shire Councils within the Catchment, Donations from community, and fee for service. These grants were enhanced by the State NRMO Capability grants which helped with the employment of Staff, allowing MCC to employ a Community Landcare Co-ordinator and a part time Executive Officer. MCC partnered with the Kerkhoff Carnaby's Group to raise money for the Moora Big Carnaby Cockatoo sculpture.





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PROGRAMS

Carnaby's Black Cockatoo Conservation

Carnaby's Black Cockatoo conservation projects funded through Iluka – involving planting native Carnaby habitat species, erecting & monitoring artificial log nests, school planting and information events, Yued engagement through revegetation and fencing activities, information booklets and videos.

Conserving, Restoring and Promoting Moore Catchment Natural Assets

Conserving Moore natural assets funded through State NRM Program – involving revegetating degraded farm land, fencing creeks and bushland, information events, and Yued engagement through seed collection and revegetation.

Aboriginal Engagement and Partnership

Funded through Iluka and State NRM Program, this project provides opportunities to work on country to collect and process native seed, revegetation and knowledge sharing. Working in partnership to improve health of Moore catchment and improve local Aboriginal community wellbeing.

The Last Stand

The Last Stand highlights the wonders and woes of WA wheatbelt wildflower country. Featuring comprehensive displays, Wild Kids Detective challenge, taxidermy animals, Weed bingo and much much more. MCC took The Last Stand to the 4 day Perth Garden festival in October 2022 and May 2023.

Coastal Rehabilitation

Funded through State NRM Program and Shire of Gingin, this project will allow herbicide spraying of 6ha Pyp Grass (*Ehrharta villosa*) to help native vegetation return. Community volunteers will revegetate 1ha using native seedlings grown from native seed collected by volunteers on the Guilderton dunes.

Healthy Soils, Healthy Environment

Good soil health has direct links to a healthy environment and positive community health. Funded through the State NRM Program, this project will provide opportunities for community and school chil-



CARNABY'S BLACK COCKATOO CONSERVATION

Iluka - "Supporting the Community to Conserve Carnaby's Black Cockatoo" Project funding \$179,300 Project Total \$340,003

12,000 native trees and shrubs were planted on 4 properties. All plants are priority species for Carnaby's forage and breeding habitat. Species included Eucalyptus, Hakeas, Melaleucas, Corymbia, Grevilleas, and Banksias.



CONSERVING MOORE NATURAL ASSETS

CSGL22064 - Supporting community stewardship of Moore River Catchment Natural Assets" Grant \$202,507

Project Total \$502,272

84,230 native trees and shrubs were planted on 4 properties. Species planted including Eucalypt, Acacia, Melaleuca, Hakea, Grevillea, Calothamnus and Atriplex.

85ha of farmland and riparian zone was rehabilitated.



10.8km of fencing erected to protect **48ha** of native and revegetated bushland by **5** land managers.



3 school hands-on conservation activities including native seedling planting and seed processing, and Moore environment and nature discovery activities.

ABORIGINAL ENGAGEMENT AND PARTNERSHIP

Partnering with local Yued community to carry out landcare and coastcare projects around the catchment. MCC includes Aboriginal engagement opportunities in all its projects. Included **planting native seedlings** in creeks, gravel pits, coastal dunes and degraded land, **native seed collection** for future revegetation projects, **sharing cultural knowledge** at events and **Moora community garden works**.





THE LAST STAND

The Last Stand highlights the wonders and woes of WA wheatbelt wildflower country. Featuring comprehensive displays, real wheatbelt trees and native plant samples, Wild Kids Detective challenge, taxidermy animals, weed bingo and much much more. MCC took The Last Stand to the Iluka open day at Dandaragan in April, and the Perth Garden festival in October 2022 and May 2023 to rapturous feedback with around 3,000+ people taking in the display including 200+ children. Back for May 2024 event. A valuable event to share regional WA with the urban community.





COASTAL REHABILITATION

CSGS21074 - "Restoration of Guilderton dunes through weed control and community planting" Grant Total \$28,821 Total Project \$88,398

Shire of Gingin- "Guilderton Dune Spraying" Grant Total \$8,170

Pyp Grass (Ehrharta villosa) control on Guilderton's dunes. Pyp Grass is a invasive weed which outcompetes native vegetation. **6ha** of Pyp grass was sprayed with herbicide in Spring 2022 & Autumn 2023. In partnership with Shire of Gingin and GCA.




